

Broke	enness:
	Sin leads us away from God's perfect design to a state of brokenness, as we see all around us today.
	Draw a circle at the top right of the page and write, "Brokenness," inside the circle.
	When life isn't working for us we begin to look for a way out. We try different things and different directions. But none lead us back to God's Design.
	Draw lines from the right side of the "Brokenness" circle and explain the different ways people look to find happiness (IE: money, drugs/alcohol, relationships, religion, etc.).
	The problem is, "They exchanged the truth of God for a lie, and worshiped and served something created instead of the Creator" (Romans 1:25).

Sin:

We need some good newsor, what the Bible calls, the "Gospel."
Because of God's perfect love, He does not want us to remain in brokenness. He has done something amazing for each of us.
Draw a circle at the bottom of the page, centered between the other two circles. Write, "Gospel," in the circle.
The Bible tells us, "For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son" (John 3:16a)
Jesus, God's only Son, came and lived a perfect life. He is the only one to never sin. But, Jesus was God's expression of love to me and you. So, Jesus said, "I'll take's sin and pay the penalty, or the wage." Jesus died on the cross for my sin and yours. He was buried, and three days later God raised Him up from the grave. This is so we can overcome our sin and brokenness and have eternal life.
"Christ died for our sins according to the ScripturesHe was buried and raised on the third day according to the Scriptures" (1 Corinthians 15:3-4).
So, how can you accept this good news for yourself, and be set free from the consequence of sin, and the pain of brokenness?
Repent and Believe:
Simply hearing the Good News (the Gospel) is not enough.
To repent means to have a change of mind that results in a change of action and direction. (As you say this, turn from one direction and face the opposite direction).
Each of us must admit that we have sinned and trust that Jesus died, was buried, and raised from the dead, so that we will be saved.
Draw the arrow away from "Brokenness," to the "Gospel" circle. Write, "Repent and Believe," below the arrow.
"Repent and believe in the good news" (Mark 1:15b).
—— "For you are saved by grace through faith, and this is not from yourselves; it is God's gift-not from works, so that no one can boast" (Ephesians 2:8-9).
"If you confess with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised Him from the dead, you will be saved" (Romans 10:9).

Recover and Pursue:
When God recovers us from our brokenness, we find a wonderful purpose for life.
This new purpose enables us to pursue God's design in all areas of our lives.
Draw an arrow beginning at the "Gospel" circle, moving up to the "God's Design" circle. Write, "Recover and Pursue," beside the arrow.
We will never be perfect, even though we are in a relationship with Jesus Christ. But
"If we confess our sins He is faithful and just to forgive us and cleanse us of all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).
"For it is God who is working in you, enabling you both to desire and to work out His good purpose" (Philippians 2:13).
Invite and Inquire:
Ask, "In this drawing, where do you see yourself?"
Review, based on their response.
Lead them in prayer as an expression of their faith.
Reassure them with, "For everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved" (Romans 10:13).
What's Next:
Exchange contact information with them.
Invite them to church.
Encourage them to read their Rible, pray attend church, and share their exciting news.

# How to Council a Student Through a Profession of Faith

### Important Tips:

- Be sure to ask open ended questions, you want the student to be talking the gospel out to you more than you are explaining it to them
- Pray and ask the Holy Spirit for discernment as to whether or not the student is making an honest profession of faith
- It is normal to be excited, but don't run ahead; the most important thing is that we do all we can to be sure they are genuine and not about celebrating a "number"
- Be excited! Trust the Lord to guide you, this is between them and the Lord, their profession of faith isn't reliant on your abilities!

### **CREATION:**

- Flip in God's Word to Genesis
- Questions you can ask:
  - O Why is it important that we know God created the world and everything in it?
  - O What makes us different than all the rest of creation?
  - o **Read Gen. 1:27** (talk about how we are image bearers)
- God created us because He desires a relationship with us and because He loves us. He doesn't NEED our company, but He desires a relationship with us.

Something along the way separated us from God, so we can't be in perfect fellowship with Him. It keeps us from being with a holy God. Do you know what that is?

### SIN:

- Flip in God's Word to Romans
- Questions you can ask:
  - What is sin? (anything we think/say/or do that disobeys God's Word)
  - O What are some examples of sin in the world?
  - o Do you believe that you are a sinner?
  - What is the punishment for our sin? (eternal separation from God)
  - o Read Romans 3:23
- Scripture tells us that for ALL have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God. So because we've sinned, our punishment is eternal separation from God. That is the state we are in on our own.

BUT God made a way for us to be with Him in perfect fellowship again. What is that one way?

### **JESUS**

- Flip in God's Word to 1 Corinthians 15:3-4 and read it together
- Questions you can ask:

- O Why could Jesus die on the cross for you and I couldn't?
- o Did Jesus want to do that for you?
- o Did Jesus deserve the punishment he was given?

Jesus died willingly for you because He loves you and cares for you that much. God so desires a relationship with you, so that through the death, burial, and resurrection of Christ, you can be made right with God and live with Him for eternity. Hebrews 9:22 says that "without the shedding of blood, there is no forgiveness of sins." Jesus' death was a necessary thing to settle the wrath of God on our behalf.

### FORGIVENESS/RECONCILIATION:

- Flip to John 1:12 and read it together
- God has given every person who confesses their sin and their need for Him, and believes in the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus as their one way to be made right with God, the free gift of salvation
- Questions to ask:
  - o Have you ever surrendered your life to Christ before?
  - O Why do you desire to do that today?
- If they say they are wanting to do that for the first time today, encourage them to pray, confessing their sin to the Lord and their need for them, their belief in Jesus, and asking God to help them live a life that's pleasing to Him (reiterate to them that it is not the prayer that saves them, nothing about the prayer is magical, and there isn't a perfect way to pray and ask the Lord- this is all about the heart change they are experiencing)
- You follow up and pray for them
- Tell them how excited you are for them, because this is the most important decision they will ever make in their life! Encourage them to tell their leaders and their small group

Now that they have chosen to surrender to Christ, there are ways they should strive to grow in their relationship with God. We do this through fellowship with other believers at church, by reading the Bible, and through praying to God.

Once you make a friend, you spend time with them to get to know them better and to grow closer to them- this is just how it is with us and Christ. Following Jesus is going to be hard, but knowing Him and eternal life with Him is SO much sweeter than our temporary time on earth. We will all get to be together in Heaven one day!

Finish by reading Romans 12:1-2 and 2 Peter 3:18 together.

### **Mandatory Reporting**

As of December 2019, North Carolina identifies mandatory reporters as anyone entrusted with the care of a juvenile. This means that anyone working within the ministry has both a legal and ethical obligation to recognize and report suspicions of mistreatment and abuse. The first level of reporting is to the Department of Social Services in the county where the child resides. In some circumstances, reporting should also be provided to local law enforcement.

As required by mandated reporting laws, staff must report any suspected abuse or neglect of a participant—whether on or off organization property or whether perpetrated by staff, volunteers, or others—to the Department of Social Services in the county the child resides. In some circumstances, a report to law enforcement may also be necessary. Reports may be made confidentially or anonymously. A person who mistakenly reports suspected abuse is immune from civil or criminal liability as long as the report was made in good faith and without malice. 17 In addition to reporting to state authorities, staff and volunteers are required to report any suspected or known abuse of participants perpetrated by staff or volunteers directly to leadership (defined as ministry pastor, Executive Pastor and Human Resources Director) so that immediate and proper steps may be taken to ensure the safety of alleged victims and others who may be at risk.

- If you witness abuse, interrupt the behavior immediately.
- If abuse is disclosed to you, assure the individual disclosing that he or she was correct to tell you.
- Protect the alleged victim from intimidation, retribution, or further abuse.
- Immediately report the allegation or incident to the proper organization authorities (based on mandatory reporting requirements) and the designated authority.
- Be sure to document the incident, disclosure, or any circumstances causing your suspicion of abuse. State only the facts.
- It is not your job to investigate the incident, but it IS your job to report the incident to your supervisor in a timely manner.
- Check back to make sure appropriate steps were taken. If not, report again to your supervisor or the designated organization authority.

### **Physical Contact**

### Inappropriate Contact:

- Full-frontal hugs
- Kisses
- Showing affection in isolated area
- Lap sitting

- Wrestling
- Piggyback rides
- Tickling
- Allowing a participant to cling to an employee's or volunteer's leg
- Any type of massage given by or to a participant
- Any form of affection that is unwanted by the participant or the staff or volunteer
- Compliments relating to physique or body development
- Touching bottom, chest, or genital areas

### Appropriate Contact:

Side hugs • Shoulder-to-shoulder or "temple" hugs • Pats on the shoulder or back • Handshakes • High-fives and hand slapping • Verbal praise • Pats on the head when culturally appropriate • Touching hands, shoulders, and arms • Arms around shoulders • Holding hands (with young children in escorting situations)

### Rule of Three:

At least: Two leaders and one student, or One leader and two students

- When meeting one-on-one with a participant, always do so in a public place where you are in full view of others.
- Avoid physical affection that can be misinterpreted. Limit affection to pats on the shoulder, high-fives, and handshakes.
- If meeting in a room or office, leave the door open or move to an area that can be easily observed by others passing by (for example, one with a window).
- Inform other staff and volunteers that you are alone with a participant and ask them to randomly drop in.
- Document and immediately report any unusual incidents, including disclosures of abuse or maltreatment, behavior problems and how they were handled, injuries, or any interactions that might be misinterpreted.

Keep our eyes open for situations like - one female student left and one leader left; stay a while - don't leave them

If you see something, say something - cutting, etc. Come to us to confirm, don't confront.

Suicidal thoughts, say something

If you hear of suicidal thoughts or notice/ are informed of a dangerous situation, you need to call the police, talk to their parents, and then call your ministry head (Anna/Tony) in that order.

If a parent is causing harm, start with the police, then call your ministry head.

If someone says they're going to commit suicide and you can't call the police for them, or their parents aren't home, get as much info as possible, text ministry head and/or associate so we can call the police. We will need information like their location, if they have a weapon, etc. Saying a phrase like, "We love you enough to take it seriously "is a helpful step if they're bothered at your handling it.

## Mentoring/Discipleship

One-on-one situations, such as mentoring individuals, introduce additional risks for false allegations. Staff and volunteers should be aware of our policies regarding these situations:

- a. Staff and volunteers must have supervisor approval & parental consent for any oneon-one mentoring/discipleship meetings
- b. Tutoring and coaching sessions with our organization's participants may not occur outside of the organization unless in a public place and preapproved by parent/guardian.
- c. Supervisors must keep a schedule of private tutoring and coaching sessions, which should include times, participants involved, and location of sessions.

Highlights the importance of contacting parents – establishing that relationship will be very important for both parties' safety.

### Offsite Contact

### Appropriate Outside Contact

- Taking groups of participants on an outing
- Attending sporting activities with groups of participants
- Attending functions at a participant's home, with parents/guardian's present

### Inappropriate Outside Contact

- Taking one participant on an outing without the parents'/guardians' permission
- Visiting one participant in the participant's home, without a parent/guardian present
- Entertaining one participant in the home of staff or volunteers
- A lone participant spending the night with staff or volunteers

### Electronic Communication, social media

We encourage all staff and volunteers to keep electronic communication public or with multiple parties of three or more whenever possible. This includes, but is not limited to Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat\*, instant messaging, texting, etc. All communication between staff and participants must be transparent & follow the request/consent submitted by the parent/guardian.

\* Snapchat - we think it's wise to avoid this platform for your safety due to the fact that photos/videos/messages disappear and there is no way to prove innocence. This is not a recommended practice.

Social Media - use your brain, cover your bases. Students within your small group is okay, if there's no way to contact them outside of SM, go ahead. We simply ask that you strive to be above reproach and avoid the appearance of evil: this is for your protection more than anything else.

### Appropriate Electronic Communication

Sending and replying to emails and text messages from participants when copying in a supervisor or the participant's parent/guardian is preferred. If talking one on one, you are required to keep communication within the scope of parental consent. Appropriate Electronic Communication are as follows:

- Communicating through "organization group pages" on Facebook or other approved public forums
  - Only communicate one on one with a student if you have parental consent, and there is proof of what was talked about.
- We encourage you to maintain a "Private" setting on your profile that participants cannot access aside from your permission

### Inappropriate Electronic Communication

- Harsh, coercive, threatening, intimidating, shaming, derogatory, demeaning or humiliating comments
- Sexually oriented conversations
- Private messages between staff and volunteers with participants without consent of parent/guardian.
- Posting pictures of organization participants on social media sites or "friending" participants on social media networking sites without parental consent.
- Posting inappropriate comments on pictures

### **Prohibited Participant-Participant Interactions**

- Hazing
- Bullying
- Derogatory name-calling
- · Games of Truth or Dare
- Singling out one child for different treatment
- Ridicule or humiliation

To adequately respond to and track incidents within the organization, all sexual activity between participants and sexualized behaviors of participants must be consistently documented.

Participant -to- Participant sexual behaviors can include inappropriate touching, exposing body parts, using sexualized language, making threats of sexual activity, engaging in sexual activity, and similar types of interactions. If staff witness participant -to- participant sexual behaviors, they are instructed to follow these guidelines:

- If you observe sexual activity between participants, you should immediately separate them.
- Calmly explain that such interactions are not permitted and separate the participants.
- Notify Anna, Colton, Addie or Tony.
- Complete the necessary paperwork including what you observed and how you responded.
- Follow your supervisor's instructions regarding notifying the authorities and informing the parents/guardians of the participant involved.
- In some cases, if the problem is recurring discipline may be required including not allowing one or both participants to return to the program.



### **How To Use This Guide:**

Below is a list of suggested resources to lead your small group. They are categorized by Bible studies, Gender based studies, and miscellaneous. The first page includes a list of all the suggested books and studies with a page number telling you where a description of them is listed in this guide. Then further on is the guide with the descriptions. There are a ton of great options to choose from, so I wanted to point out a few important things to consider when choosing what might work for you.

- 1. Length of time: some of these studies are for 10 weeks, some are for only 4 or 5. Now the good news is you can decide how fast you go through it if you actually do 1 week per week, or if you break it up into more to fit your timetable but think ahead on that.
- 2. What your audience needs: while we tried to keep these suggestions relevant to your audience, knowing your specific small group may be helpful to determining what fits them and meets their needs in what season they are going through
- 3. What you are passionate about: just like a student learns so much more from a teacher who's passionate about what they're teaching, you can teach based off what you're passionate about too! If you love prayer, go through a book on prayer; if you love Proverbs, teach on that. Your passion will speak through your teaching sometimes louder than the specific words you say.
- 4. Pray: don't be afraid to go to the Lord when you don't have the answers. He will help you; He will sustain you, and He will speak through you as you pour into these kids' lives. Give Him room to work, and He will. Ask Him to be the One changing their hearts and lives, and He will.
- 5. Ask for help when you need it: we on the Fuse team are here for you! Don't feel like you must walk this alone. The Lord created us as a body to continue to support one another and grow together. Whether one of your students is going through something or you are, whether you need to buy something for your students like their small group materials or a Bible, don't hesitate to ask! We're here for you, to support you and walk with you through this adventure of pouring into high schoolers together!

Alpha makes it easy to invite friends to have spiritual conversations which explore life's biggest questions in a safe and respectful way. The Alpha

Youth Film Series is created for audiences 13-18 years old. Alpha's approach to hospitality,

faith, and discussion is designed to welcome everyone, especially those who might not describe themselves as Christians or church-goers.

Each session includes time for a large group, short teaching, and small group discussion. The DVD also includes three training sessions for your small group hosts and helpers and the discussion guide.



**Rooted:** Rooted is a 10-week, group-discipleship experience that introduces participants to foundational Christian beliefs, stories from the global Church, and spiritual rhythms for daily life. Workbooks include 5 devotional readings for each week and prompts for personal

- How would you define your relationship with Jesus? Are you truly his follower or just a fan? Using humor, personal stories, and biblical truth,


Idleman challenges students to look at what it means to call themselves Christians and follow Jesus' radical call.





and live with an unwavering devotion to Him





### Half Truths: God Helps Those Who Help Themselves and Other Things the Bible




gospel, and in witnessing to the truth and beauty of Christ.





and friend. The four-session study consists of an Immerse Lesson the first week, followed by three more traditional lessons.






